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Mr. Bullwinkle & the 20-millionth

he building of an eventful Ford—one which is singled out as a milestone in the production history of the company—doesn't happen by chance. It goes without saying that the selection of the car which came off the assembly line as precisely 'Ford 20-millionth' from among Ford Motor Company's 32 operating domestic assembly plants in the spring of 1931 would have required an entire staff of officials with a coast-to-coast party line. And that doesn't even take in to consideration Fords being assembled on a large scale in foreign lands!

Milestone cars are designated! When the time seems near, a

Milestone cars are designated! When the time seems near, a car body in the plant most needing the publicity is simply affixed with the proper signing . . . newsmen are called in to witness the imminent event and top officials in the company gather at the end of the assembly line to be photographed with the historic automobile.

Not a sham ceremony so much as a practical one in light of the logistics.

So it came to pass that the '20-millionth' Ford ever made would officially be a 1931 Model A Fordor Sedan assembled at Dearborn April 14, 1931. That it was the new 'slant-windshield' model just announced in March and still not available

to any significant degree beyond Detroit may have weighed on the decision to assign the number to a Dearborn sedan.

Following the ceremonies at the end of the assembly line where officials such as production men Sorensen and Martin beamed as Henry and Edsel Ford inspected their gleaming trophy, the crowd moved outside and watched as the senior Ford got behind the wheel and drove off to his Fairlane estate. There, in front of a battery of cameramen, he posed the car alongside his famous 1896 Quadricycle.

Then by prearrangement, the car was turned over to Kentucky Colonel, C.D. Hilton, who would lead a convoy made up of 20 new Model A Fords on a nationwide publicity tour. The group would leave the Rouge plant that day with Colonel Hilton driving the main attraction and programmed to visit the major cities and many Ford dealers in the U.S. Mailed out to dealers prior to their departure were window banners to be displayed during the caravan's visit and reading, See the Twenty Millionth Ford Here Today!

The caravan toured first East to New York where it was

The caravan toured first East to New York where it was driven by Eleanor Roosevelt (whose husband was then New York's governor) then headed for the West Coast. A memor-

able stop was the session of mutual admiration with Sidney Smith, creator of the Andy Gump comic strip—at his palatial home in Lake Geneva, Wisconsin. Most states visited by Ford 20-millionth assigned license plate number 20,000,000 and many governors, mayors and other dignitaries signed the car's logbook. The car visited Ford dealers; received the checkered flag at the Indianapolis Speedway; was inducted into the Sioux tribe and was the first privately owned car to descend to the bottom of Hoover Dam. Arriving in Los Angeles, California, it very timely joined in for that city's 150th birthday celebration and received even greater accolades when film star, Douglas Fairbanks, chauffeured it in the parade.

From southern California, the caravan of Model A Fords drove north and arrived at the Richmond Assembly Plant on the morning of September 16, 1931. Situated on Richmond inner harbor off San Francisco Bay, the new Ford facility had just been dedicated that August 1st.

The Bullwinkle Tour

Now 80 years young and living a comfortable life at his home in Berkeley, California, Clarence A. Bullwinkle was the manager of the Ford Assembly Plant at Richmond from the time it was opened in 1931 to the time he became a Ford dealer in 1940. The important management position was the highpoint in a career with Ford that began in 1912.


The photos illustrating this article are from Mr. Bullwinkle's personal scrapbook and were taken during the 20-millionth Ford's 1931 visit to his sales territory.

With advance notice from his parent office, Bullwinkle assembled his employes on the sidewalk in front of the Richmond Assembly Plant when the milestone car caravan arrived. Officiating at the tumultuous arrival ceremony, Bullwinkle announced a publicity tour which he would personally lead, with Colonel Hilton's collaboration of course, first across the Bay to San Francisco and then throughout his southern sales territory to acquaint Ford dealers and their townsmen of the great production achievement.

Two cycle officers, assigned by the California Highway Patrol, were to escort the party which would range the coastal valleys from the Sequoias to the Pacific as far south as San Luis Obispo.

Leaving Richmond, the party toured for a week then Colonel Hilton and his original caravan pointed north for Oregon for a stop in Klamath Falls—a parade from there to Ashland—thence north to Portland over the Pacific Highway. The group would then tour the Southwest and South then turn back to Dearborn where it would be honored again.



Ford 20-millionth, a Fordor Sedan, as it appeared at Dearborn, Michigan, April 14, 1931.



Many typical early interior appointments easily date this original 1928 Fordor front compartment. The brown hairline stripe seat material was used exclusively through the first year of production, but the raised moulding on the seat sides and door panels was a feature only of the early models.

The cowl vent door was also a unique item, again used through 1928. The celluloid visor was discontinued in mid-

1928, about the same time the emergency brake handle was moved front and center of the gearshift lever. Brightwork is nickel plated, and the gas tank is striped.

Conspicuously absent is the windshield wiper and motor. Perhaps the celluloid visor was an experiment in eliminating that equipment?

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
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EDITOR SAYS

73,000 Miles is only a Start

SOME weeks ago we published an account of a Ford that had been driven 73,000 miles in less than a year by three mail carriers in Iowa.

The article created much comment and brought many letters telling of the unusual reliability, economy and long life of the Ford. Here is an interesting letter from the editor of a newspaper in Kansas.

"In one of your recent advertisements in weekly newspapers you tell of a Ford that has been driven 73,000 miles in less than a year.

"That's no mileage at all for a Ford. There

is a Ford in this community that was driven exceptionally low. After the car was traded 120,000 miles before it was traded in.


"The car was bought in August, 1928, and driven until November, 1930, by its owner. He is a carrier of the Wichita Daily Eagle, making a route of 150 miles daily with a morning and evening paper. On Sunday, only one trip of 75 miles is made. About 50 miles of the route is over paved streets—the rest is on rough dirt and gravel streets through three small towns.

"Operating and up-keep costs were

exceptionally low. After the car was traded in for a new Ford I am informed that it was overhauled and is now giving good service to its new owner."

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> of miles. The price is low because of large production and unusual Ford manufacturing facilities.



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
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
